The Monsoon Chapter 7 Explorations in painting by Om Prakash

This year, under the aegis of The Monsoon Festival, we present the work of Om Prakash, in his 55th solo exhibition, taking place in the 80th year of the artist's life. We present a selection of his recent works executed between 2006-2011.

Om Prakash's works defy stylistic definition, and span a range of multi-faceted approaches, including abstraction, a "neotantric" play of geometries (a controversial and problematic label but useful anyway), and even landscapes and realism. While Om Prakash is undoubtedly an abstract thinker, it is also equally true that he has never been a slave to any particular stream of art, and has forever freely explored without becoming a formula painter or subscribing to stagnant templates.

There is clearly an Om Prakash way of seeing things, but it's not so easy to understand that it can be put on a plate or sorted into neat compartments of this or that. One can almost never say 'Om Prakash will never do this!' because he may just surprise you with something totally unexpected, a deviation from his own path of comfort, as he has done relentlessly over the last many decades. This is a commitment to eclecticism. an anthem





of being free and unfettered.

His artistic journey includes a range of subject matters, approaches, sensibilities and techniques which have all enriched his art, resulting in a rich diversity of artistic repertoire some of which is reflected in this exhibition, themed on the monsoon. The artist etches sensitive portrayals of the spirit of the season with utmost mastery of form and a mysterious spiritual engagement with various expressions. His work dwells on a delicate balance of structure and an abstraction imbued with a unique energy.

Never willing to compromise and forever chasing his pristine artistic visions, Om Prakash is an artist's artist. He has had an illustrious journey and is a renowned name in Indian art, having contributed immensely to contemporary art in a fiercely individualistic and original manner. Om Prakash is an institution in himself and has been a hoary albeit quiet presence on the Indian art scene since the 1950s. He has enthusiastically shared his vision with younger generations as a teacher of art and aesthetics and a guru for 40 years. It would be no exaggeration to say that he is a national treasure.











